## Abstract:

Violent conflicts have inflicted immeasurable damage on man and his environment, yet there seems no end to conflicts. While there have been debates over the connection between religion and violent conflicts, the world has not relented in the quest for solutions to the causes of religious and many other conflicts around the world; and especially in heterogeneous societies. In Nigeria for example, religion has been a major source of devastating violent conflicts which have ravaged the country for decades. Religion is replayed at almost every facet of the society as it has become a determining factor in the country's quest for lasting peace and development; yet it is not clear whether it is religion itself or the faithful that is the problem.
